REASON FOR REFERRAL

Mr. David Lohr is a 50-year-old Caucasian male who was referred by Mr. Michael Brown, Esq., Deputy Federal Public Defender, for an assessment to evaluate his overall psychological functioning as well as suitability for re-integration into the community.

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

Based on a review of available records, Mr. Lohr has a substantial history of psychiatric symptoms and treatment dating back to at least 1999. He has been diagnosed with Schizophrenia, Unspecified Schizophrenia and Other Psychotic Disorder, Unspecified Mental Disorder, Unspecified Mood Disorder and Depressive Episode Unspecified. Mr. Lohr's psychiatric symptoms have been so acute that he has required involuntary psychiatric hospitalization on at least three occasions. Although Mr. Lohr was prescribed antipsychotic medications while he was hospitalized, he reported he discontinued his medications after he was discharged.

Mr. Lohr's psychiatric symptoms have consisted largely of psychotic symptoms. His psychotic symptoms have included unkempt and disheveled appearance suggesting poor hygiene, flat affect (lack of emotional expression), bizarre behavior, disorganized thought process, auditory hallucinations as well as delusions (fixed, false beliefs) that were paranoid and persecutory in nature. He reported his auditory hallucinations consisted of voices "narrating" his life. In terms of delusions, he reported he previously believed that he worked in law enforcement and his assignment was to help save the environment. He described he believed if he made bleach cold or froze it, the bleach would create a "humidity cloud," which would result in rain and improve the drought in California. Given that he did not have access to refrigerators and freezers since he was homeless at the time, he described he utilized retail locations to accomplish this goal.


Following his arrest and incarceration, Mr. Lohr was found incompetent to stand trial due to his acute psychiatric symptoms and was admitted to Federal Medical Center, Butner (FMC Butner) on December 27, 2019. During his hospitalization at FMC Butner, he was noted to

be unkempt and irritable. He exhibited flat affect (lack of emotional expression) and a disorganized thought process. He also was described as endorsing delusional (exhibited fixed, false beliefs) and paranoid beliefs. He initially refused to take any medication to treat the aforementioned symptoms. However, in July 2020, he voluntarily agreed to take Risperdal, an antipsychotic medication, which improved his psychotic symptoms. He subsequently was restored to competency given that he was psychiatrically stable and he was discharged from FMC Butner on August 7, 2020. Since then, Mr. Lohr indicated he has continued to take his Risperdal while incarcerated, which he described is effective in managing his psychiatric symptoms. He indicated that while he was at FMC Butner, he received education regarding the importance of medication compliance to treat his mental illness, and now appreciates the importance of his medication. As such, he reported he plans to continue to take his Risperdal, even in the community.

Although Mr. Lohr currently meets the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders – 5th Edition (DSM-5) criteria for **Schizophrenia**, which is a severe and persistent mental illness, his mental illness can be effectively managed in the community with ongoing adherence to his psychotropic medication, Risperdal. In clinical studies, Risperdal has been shown to effectively treat Schizophrenia in 81% of patients.¹ There also is a long-term injectable option with Risperdal that is administered once every few weeks, which ensures medication compliance among patients where inconsistency is a concern. However, Mr. Lohr has voluntarily continued to take Risperdal since August 2020, which was apparent during the current evaluation because he presented as psychiatrically stable and without any psychiatric symptoms. As such, it appears his current treatment regimen has been effective in addressing and managing his psychiatric symptoms and he expressed a willingness to continue taking his medication in the community. Further, individuals with Schizophrenia can successfully re-integrate into society, and even live independently and maintain employment, with ongoing treatment and consistent medication adherence.

Background

The following information is presented by Raven Barrow, Psy.D., MA, MFT, Investigator, with the Federal Public Defender, Central District of California, assigned to the David Lohr case. It is provided in response to a request for an explanation of Mr. Lohr’s post-release plan. This information was compiled via phone calls with Antonio Griffin, the residence manager with Care Industry 2 and Full Service Partnership (FSP) coordinator for Service Provider Area (“SPA”) 6, Perla Cabrera, and, Tony Sapien, psychiatric social worker with Augustus F. Hawkins Mental Health Center.

Introduction

Upon his release from jail, Mr. Lohr will receive support services via Care Industry 2 and mental health treatment from Augustus F. Hawkins Mental Health Center. Augustus Hawkins, is a social support service program that offers a Full Service Partnership (FSP) program. FSP “is designed to reduce recidivism, homelessness, substance abuse, psychiatric hospitalizations and incarcerations in homeless mentally ill individuals.”¹ Augustus F. Hawkins provides specialty mental health services to individuals that are Medi-Cal eligible and meet the mental health necessity criteria. They will do an intake, an assessment to determine a diagnostic profile, a case plan, and treatment goals to provide Mr. Lohr with appropriate mental health services.

Housing

Mr. Lohr will reside at Care Industry 2, located on 1220 E. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd, Los Angeles, CA 90011. Care Industry 2 is located in SPA 6. Care Industry 2 offers three meals a day and has community treatment providers come in to provide psychiatric and medical care once a month for all of its residents. This facility was chosen specifically to provide a higher level of care and support, as it provides on-site mental health and supportive services, so that Mr. Lohr can transition to stable community placement and prepare for independent living.

The cost for housing is \$800 a month. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, it could take Mr. Lohr longer to get connected to his benefits. We would like to establish consistent and stable housing so that Mr. Lohr can get his most basic needs met to assist with maintaining his stability post-release and to not exacerbate his mental health symptomology. Therefore, we are requesting that United States Probation and Pretrial Services pay for three to four months of housing.

Care Industry 2 has a history of working with Full Service Partnership programs. Mr. Lohr will be able to easily access treatment at Personal Involvement Center when needed. This is essential because Mr. Lohr has had difficulty in the past accessing mental health treatment.

Mental and Physical Health

A referral for Full Service Partnership Services was placed with SPA 6 and approved on March 7, 2021. Mr. Lohr will receive mental health services at Augustus F. Hawkins Mental Health Center. They have already assigned Mr. Lohr a psychiatric case manager. At Augustus Hawkins, Mr. Lohr will have access to a low staff-to-client ratio and a 24/7 Crisis Availability Specialist. They will create a treatment plan that is focused on Mr. Lohr's wellness. He will receive psychiatric services, mental health support, and assistance with long-term housing to alleviate the need for United States Probation & Pretrial Services to continue to pay for his housing costs. Mr. Lohr will also have access to out-patient services that are performed by licensed physicians and therapists specialized in psychiatry, psychology and psychotherapy. If Mr. Lohr has a psychiatric emergency, they will provide local support and/or admit him to a local Acute Psychiatric Hospital, if necessary.

It is essential that Mr. Lohr be released with a 90-day supply of his psychotropic medication. Mr. Lohr's psychiatric case manager is aware of his severe mental health-related problems and does not want an interruption in his medication due to any problems with accessibility resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Independent Living

Mr. Lohr has expressed his desire to have access to the right mental health treatment so that he can work towards living independently. The Full Service Partnership program is designed to service clients with severe mental health needs like Mr. Lohr. After learning about Mr. Lohr, Perla Cabrera who is the Adult Mental Health Coordinator for SPA 6 Full Service Partnership, believes Mr. Lohr can be successful in this program. The foundation of the program is to do “whatever it takes to help clients get on the path to recovery and wellness.”² Mr. Lohr will have the support to assist him in meeting his daily needs, such as taking his medication, and will be actively involved in his treatment. He will learn how to integrate back into the community by learning to reside in a smaller community at Care Industry 2. He will have the structure and the mental health care that he not only needs but deserves.


I understand who I am, where I am and I acknowledge I am not a cop.
